Mixed emotions

Usually, I love my job. Every once in a while, I hate it.

On Friday I felt both emotions in less than an hour and the switch from elation to anger left me dizzy.

The hour started when I interviewed Jon Hurst, one of the organizers of Acton's Terry Fox Run.

Thanks to the unflinching, hard work of the committee and the generosity of Acton residents, last fall's Terry Fox Run raised \$25,798 for cancer research. That puts Acton at Number 16 on the list of 612 per capita run sites in Ontario. Acton, with less than 7,000 people, raised more money than many much larger towns and cities, and it was hard not to get swept up in Jon's enthusiasm.

I remembered being out at the High School track early that morning last September and seeing babes in strollers and the elderly in wheelchairs — all out to do their part to keep Terry Fox's dream of finding a cure for cancer alive.

Jon's enthusiasm was infectious as he praised the 185 people who actually made the run and the hundreds who pledged money and helped organize the event. Jon was not surprised that Acton, again, made in the top 20 of run sites in Ontario, and pointed to other successful Acton fundraisers, like the Wheels for Matthew campaign, to show that Acton citizens really care.

Jon, quickly discounting his role in the success of Acton's 12th Terry Fox Run, praised Acton citizens for the generosity, commitment and quiet determination to get the job done.

I left the interview feeling proud that I was part of a community that really cared, that didn't just pay lip service to a cause, but dug in and made a difference.

Then, I went home and got a phone call that quickly ended my euphoria and left me equally sad and angry and wondering how someone could be so senselessly cruel.

The call was from an Acton man who had invited me and my camera over the week before to see two mallard ducks, happily swimming laps in his backyard pool. The very tame drake and hen were regulars at the man's home but this was the first time they had headed into the pool.

Like kids, we laughed and marvelled at the pair, who oblivious to us, were feeding and having a good time in the water collected on the pool cover.

Less than a week later, the pool owner called to say that the hen was dead, run over *deliberately* by a speeding motorist who swerved to hit her as she stood at the end of his driveway.

Unfortunately, nobody got a description or licence number of the idiot driver who left her dead, with her mate standing over her, quacking plaintively and refusing to leave her side.

I didn't think much about the successful Terry Fox run over the weekend, but the image of the mallard and her broken, unlaid eggs, and the stupid driver, was a hard one to shake.

Unofficial contest?


To the Editor,
