Noting that several weeks ago Council refused to give a \$36 grant to the Halton Crisis Centre, Rennie urged his colleagues to be consistent.

lar requests and that we were trying to hold our budget down," Rennie said.

"I know the people at the Fall Fair won't appreciate this, but maybe this year, it (waiving the fee) is not the right thing to do," Rennie said.

Acton Counc. Norm Elliott noted that the Fair Board has budget constraints of their own and that the fee had been waived in the past.

When several Councillors commented that the Town might be in very tough economic shape because of the Provincial budget and spending cutbacks, Town administrator Don Costea told them once

the final financial picture is clear, Council could work on a policy for waiving fees.

Currently the Town can waive required licensing fees if the proceeds from the event are to be used for religious, philanthropic or patriotic purposes.

Fair Board president George Henderson is grateful the Town waived the fee.

"Financial support from the Town is very important to the Fair, especially in recessionary times," Henderson said.

"Back in 1913 it was the county and Town that initiated the Acton Fall Fair. We need that continued municipal support."
