# Ambrose directs AHS Ladies softballers to third win

The Burlington Lord Elgin Ladies' Softball team couldn't solve either the directions to M.Z. Bennett last Wednesday or the pitching arsenal of Acton High starter Kelly Ambrose.

Intending to make a turn at Hwy. 25 and Steeles Ave., three Elgin players (pitcher Lindsay Baldwin, centre-fielder Jenn Yates and her sister Nicole) and head coach Neil Curtis botched the directions to Acton and ended up in Toronto.

They finally arrived here after the fourth inning. However, their team's pitching unravelled after the second frame and Elgin, fielding a depleted lineup of eight players, was down 9-4.

Ambrose, who had her fastball humming, gave up an unearned run in the first as normally sound shortstop Lindsay Holmes booted two routine grounders. But Acton rebounded with a seven-run third en route to their third straight win, this time 9-6.

Elgin starter Corri Brown, who threw three innings, gave up no runs, a single hit, walked two and struck out seven and had Acton players swatting at a blurred ob-

ject to set the tone for an early pitching showdown.

The Burlington squad jumped out to an early 4-1 lead in the second as Giselle Jones belted a towering drive to centre off Ambrose for a two-run triple that scored Michelle Skelley and Laura Lindsay. However, the ball eluded Acton catcher Mandy Bosch and went out of play to bring home Jones.

Acton second baseman Deanna Louth scored Ruth Tabata and Lindsay Holmes on an infield single in the home half of the sevenrun mercy third inning. The visitors inserted losing hurler Nancy Hutson, who was as effective as a five-year-old Duracell battery.

A run-scoring single, double and throwing error later and the home side lead was padded to 8-4.

The visitors couldn't touch Ambrose in the fourth as she mowed down all comers to finish the day with a strong four innings, giving up four runs (one earned), three hits and striking out seven.

"I felt tired at the beginning of the game," admitted Ambrose, who left the game with her team up 9-4, "but it always takes a while to get going when it's cold.

"We've worked a lot on our offence lately and I think we have to work a lot more on our defence."


Elgin got two back in the fifth as Lindsay ripped an RBI-single off Acton reliever Sharon Kearsey to score Brown. Kearsey, though, shut down her opponents the next innings to finish at two innings pitched, allowing three hits, a run and a walk.

Sam Gudgeon closed the game for the locals, serving up a run to go with a strikeout.

Lord Elgin's record dropped to 0-4-2, while Acton climbed to 3-

"Our team played well and I got to play all but one of my players," said a pleased Acton coach Tom Wright. "On Monday at Nelson (12-2 Acton), there was such good hustle by the girls that we could score on any hit with a runner at second, but today they were just standing at second.

"Elgin's first pitcher (Brown) was so good and the others were so weak, but with this league you know you're only going to face their best pitcher for four of the seven innings. You have to make hay when the sun shines."
