Non-smoking by-law hot topic

Despite the intensity of Acton development issues, a proposed commercial non-smoking by-law proved to be one of the most contentious items at Monday night's Town Council meeting.

The Halton Regional Health Department forwarded a report based on an investigation of other municipalities' by-laws (over 100) already in effect, with the note that they hope a by-law will be effective here by September.

Under the proposed by-law, smoking would be prohibited completely in retail stores, shopping mall concourses, service lines, reception areas and health care facilities — save for a designated

As well, among the recommendations was that a minimum of 50 per cent of the floor area of a restaurant be designated as nonsmoking, with restaurants of under 30 seats exempt.

Councillors expressed concern about the classification of restaurant and whether that includes pubs, taverns, and the like, which attract an evening clientele with different needs.

Acton councillor Gerald Rennie stressed that in a small pub of 32


seats, having 16 designated smoking and 16 non-smoking seats wouldn't make much difference.

"It seems that it would be such a small area that I cannot see how it would be effective," Rennie said. He proposed raising the exempt number from 30 seats to 40. Councillor Anne Currie further suggested raising the minimum number of seats to 50.

After 45 minutes of somewhat heated and confused discussion, a motion carried by Councillor Norm Elliott to lower the nonsmoking percentage of restaurants to 25 per cent (and to separate them from completely nonsmoking commercial establishments within the document) was lost.

Councillor Rennie's motion for the restaurant exemption to be increased to 40 seats was passed, but council rejected the entire motion, leaving the town without a commercial non-smoking by-law until the next time council tackles it.




