



Sexual Assault — Date Rape

Sexual assault is any unwanted act of a sexual nature imposed by one person on another without that person's consent. Sexual assault may include kissing, fondling or intercourse.

Until recently people believed that a person was at the greatest risk of being sexually assaulted when walking alone after dark. However, this is a myth as most sexual assault victims are assaulted in a private residence and often in the victim's own home. Further, victims of sexual assault usually know their attackers.

Is sexual assault a problem? Yes it is. Statistics suggest one in four women and one in eight men will be sexually assaulted at some point in their lives. Studies indicate that the majority of people who are assaulted do not report the incident to the police. The reasons for this vary. Many victims fear that they won't be believed, feel ashamed or blame themselves for the incident, fear their attacker may assault them again, or believe that the police can do nothing about it.

Sexual assault is a crime of power, control and violence. If a person says "no" it means "no," not "yes" or "maybe."

In order to prevent these incidents from occurring, we must educate the public. We all must be educated to know what sexual assault is and what we can do about it. In March of this year a pilot project was started in E.C. Drury High School in Milton. An officer attends Grade 11, 12 and O.A.C. home rooms and talks to the students in an effort to increase awareness and educate them in the legal aspects of sexual assault. The program has been well received by the students and staff and will hopefully be expanded into other area high schools in the fall. The true impact of the program may never be known, but if it prevents one person from becoming a victim, it has been a success.




