Everson becomes Canadian bowhunting champion at 10

Two weeks ago, 10-year-old Mark Everson never thought he would enter the fourth annual 3D Canadian Bowhunters clinic and show at Pioneer Sports Club in Kitchener.

Today, he stands in his McDonald Boulevard backyard shooting arrow after arrow into a styrofoam block for an hour everyday, knowing he's No. 1, the Canadian champion in the largest 3D Bowhunterstournamentin Canada.

capture the title in the 10-andunder category.

"I never thought I would get this good to win the Canadian championships," says Mark, who's been involved with the sport for the past five years and competing in tournaments the last two. "I don't just go to win because not everyone's going to win."

Only five points separated Everson from his fifth-place opponent. In 3D shooting, Everson shot at 40 life-size and life-like animal targets in the qualifying rounds on Friday and Saturday and 20 in the championship.

The lung area of the animals were worth 20 points and the heart area 25. "It was one or two heart areas that made the difference (for Mark's win)," explains Mark's father, Rick. "We (myself and wife Kathy) are really proud of him. We were surprised when he qualified in fifth-place and then when he won ..."

Mark, who shoots for the Royal City Bowmen club in Guelph, said he intends to remain involved in the sport for the rest of his life.

"I like having fun and winning first," he said, laughing, adding the competitive nature of the sport is worth it.

Ontario Federation of Archers Association (OFAA) shooting differs from 3D shooting in that the

resident vaulted from fifth-place former involves round targets and at the start of the balmy day to marked yardages to determine the shooter's scoring. Three-dimensional shooting involves huntinglike conditions. The bowhunter must estimate the distance from the stake to the animal and be accurate in order to accumulate points.

Mark nudged his way to fifth following Saturday's qualification run.

After driving home that night, Mark wanted to find that glitch in his repertoire that would hopefully make him champion. He immediately entered the backyard and practised for two hours.

"He's got the drive behind him," Rick says. "Kathy and I will keep him going as much as we can. He seemed to be in his element on Sunday for the final."

And how. But what made the difference in a matter of 24 hours?

"Mark didn't feel the pressure like the other boys did," says Rick. "I just told him to have fun and he did. He likes shooting at animal

In Mark's age group, he uses his fingers to discharge the arrows as opposed to a release bow.

For now, the Grade 4 M.Z. Bennett student will polish his concentration skills and improve his judging of distances before moving up a division to the 11 to 15-year-olds, where he'll use a release bow.
