

New law gives breathing room

Continued from Front Page staff is working on "day-to-day maintenance" plus helping with the restructuring plan: "There's a fair chunk of work on the process of suspended legal animation."

Following the alarming number of bankruptcies in recent years, a new law was introduced in November similar to the Chapter 11 American law allowing bankrupt U.S. businesses time to catch their breath and negotiate with creditors. The newness of the Canadian version means a lot of people are still learning the ropes of the new process, explained Dawkins.

To save the Hide House Dawkins' proposal must be ap-

proved by 50 per cent of the unsecured creditors (creditors with no collateral) representing 66 per cent of the amount of the unsecured part of the debt. For example, if there were 11 unsecured creditors six of them representing two-thirds of the unsecured amount owed must approve the plan. The secured creditors—those holding collateral on bankrupt property they can repossess and re-sell—then veto or approve the plan. The Hide House secured creditor is the CIBC.

Don Dawkins, Hide House C.E.O., has said the Acton business community is failing or suffering because "population growth has not been approved to support it."






