
Studio and the Acton Citizens' day). For dessert, you might want to sample the goodies at one of the church groups' bake sales.

Forever Young

Mel Gibson stars in this light-hearted love story. Daniel McCormick (Gibson) is shattered by the supposedly imminent death of his true love, so he agrees to be part of a military experiment. McCormick is frozen alive in 1939 and found in 1992 by two young boys. In his quest to find his friend Harry, the inventor that performed the experiment, McCormick encounters various obstacles, from 1990's technology to military intelligence. This is a genuinely nice movie with a nice ending. Definitely good family fare. Rated PG, 102 minutes, released in 1992.

Bodies Of Evidence

Madonna headlines in this provocative film and that alone should speak volumes. The plot, when it actually appears, follows the trial of Rebecca Carlson (Madonna), accused of manslaughter in the death of her wealthy, older lover. Willem Defoe plays her lawyer, who she continually seduces (this actually accounts for about three-quarters of the movie) and convinces of her innocence. The only dramatic point occurs with the revelation of the culprits — this occurs in the last two minutes of the film. Overall this is a typical Madonna sex-flick, devoid of any dramatic talent. Rated R, 121 minutes, released in 1992.
