## Girl Guides mix work with pleasure

The Girl Guides who left Acton windows and townspeople sparkling Friday have helped create the perfect definition of a working vacation.

The 2,000 Canadian and 500 international Girl Guides who are camped in Guelph near Guelph Lake from July 12 to 22 are dividing into groups of 40 and invading Acton and area towns to wash windows, pick up litter, entertain senior citizens or help out the communities in other ways.

But they are also touring Wonderland, Niagara Falls, the CN Tower and other sites. The girls' traditional entertainment such as camping, hiking, canoeing, trail riding and sailboating is mixed with belly dancing, toymaking and scuba diving.

"The girls have seven days of planned activities, everything you can imagine, around the clock," one of the 500 Guide Leaders, Judy Clark, said Friday. "That Monday they arrived in Guelph and were still arriving at 11:30 pm; the buses were rolling in all night.

girls, and we are doing community service in communities like Elora, Fergus and Eden Mills," said Clark. Friday was Acton's turn, and a group of 40 Canadian girls plus one Guide from Ireland and one from England targeted a score of community problems.

"We're doing window washing, cleaning, painting, visiting seniors and helping pregnant ladies," Clark said Friday, describing some Acton chores.

The project took two years to set up, with Girl Guide Service Coordinator Sheila Ripley calling communities in the area, finding out their needs, and deciding how many girls would be needed.

ASSIC Seniors and Volunteer Coordinator Sue Haggith was Acton liaison with the Girl Guides International Conference, and was excited by the idea of inspiring community service this way. "This is a new project so it takes some time and work to match the girls to people who need them, but it's also a lot of fun."

The 500 Guide Leaders arrived in Guelph Saturday July 10, to set everything up, and two days later 2,500 Guides from across Canada and the world showed up for 'Guelph '93 International,' the Guides' international conference. This year's theme is: Living in Harmony.
