# Schools face challenges

It's time for school again as students and teachers around this community headed back into the classrooms last week to face new educational challenges that may lie ahead of them this year.

"It's nice to see the staff and students back together," said Chris Logan, principal of McKenzie-Smith Middle School.

One of the major concerns for all schools in Acton is provincial government cutbacks, caused by the Social Contract passed earlier this year.

However, most of the staff in public schools will not know the situation they're in until they meet with the Halton School Board sometime this week.

"Many of them (staff) are more interested in getting back to teaching," says Dr. Paul Tamblyn, vice principal at Acton High.

Lynn Snider, principal of M.Z. Bennett says that he is concerned on how the cutbacks will affect the

future of his school.

"Our major challenge is how we minimize the impact on the children," says Snider.

The staff at M.Z. Bennett and Robert Little share one thing in common this year in terms of expectations.

They want their students to be more familiar with technology.

"We want to prepare our kids for the 21st century," says Bob Bell, Robert Little vice principal.

Snider said that he and the teachers at his school want to show the students how computers can help them learn, instead of just teaching them technological skills. "We want to implement instructional technology," he says.
