In the span of a week, the Acton High Senior Boys' volleyball team has shifted from being stronger than the Junior and Midget units to nothing at all.

Bruce Andrews, co-coach of the school's track team, indicated last Wednesday that former German national player Steven Liebig would not be coaching the team for unspecified reasons.

And after several attempts to find a replacement went awry, Andrews halted operations.

"It wasn't that there weren't enough members to play. He (Liebig) phoned the school and left a message saying that he couldn't coach," said a shocked Andrews. "It's kind of disappointing, but some of the players can join the cross-country team and about six of the players were Junior-aged, so they can go play at that level."

Andrews said he mentioned the coaching vacancy at a recent meeting, to former coaches around the school and to two coaches who were already committed to other school teams.

"Two former coaches were taking extra-curricular scholastic courses and to ask them would be unfair," Andrews said. "I had a person willing to coach the team but he made it clear he knew nothing about the sport."

Andrews stressed that knowledge of the game is a must.

"If you assist and there's no expertise, the players will start running the show themselves and you run into problems," he assured.
