## Ban on smoking by Jan. 3

The Town of Halton Hills passed a resolution on Monday which would ban or limit smoking in all commercial properties except bars and taverns.

The resolution bans smoking from any public area of business including service lines, lobbies and reception areas, shopping mall concourses, elevators, escalators and stairways. Restaurants must dedicate 25 per cent of seating to a non-smoking section, but restaurants that seat under 30 people are exempt, along with taverns and

bars. The bylaw is scheduled to take effect Jan. 3, 1994, after passing a final vote by council.

"I think this is the thin edge of the wedge, "said Gerald Rennie, councillor for the Acton area.

Rennie told the general committee that in future people may view smoking in the same way as spitting on the floor. It would be generally reviled — especially in public.

"Probably the correct thing to do is to ban smoking from all public places," Rennie said, but allowed that a compromise for the food service industry was accept-

was the first the first of the

able — for now.

"We have to recognize that this is the absolute minimum," he said.

The overwhelming majority of committee members voted in favor of the resolution, but were concerned with adverse effects of a tobacco ban on local bars and taverns.

After much debate, it was finally decided that a food service business would be designated as a tavern or bar, and exempted from the bylaw, if alcohol accounted for over 50 per cent of sales.

## OHH makes it official Friday

A couple of local businesses have seen the Hide House's opening rub off.

Tim McElhone, co-owner with his wife Bridget of the TimBri Teahouse, has seen a healthy increase in business.

"The trend has been definitely noticable on weekends, since most of our weekday business is mainly local," said McElhone. "But we're definitely preparing for this week-

Thanksgiving weekend was one of TimBri's busiest last year, and with plenty of stock in the building and the likelihood of extra staff on Monday, TimBri will be ready if history repeats itself.

So will the Hide House.

"From early September, each week business has increased and

that's the ultimate reason for the official opening Friday," Dawkins said. "We're steadily re-stocking the store with fresh and more current items and at the end of the week it will be largely completed."

During the first two weeks of the Hide House's re-opening in September, a good portion of the visitors were locals. Their response has been appreciated by the president of the local establishment.
