It would be even better if criminals, once captured, tried and sentenced, would be dealt with in a way befitting their crimes.



It was a tough election, and an eye opener. We agreed at the outset of the campaign to take the "high road" and we stuck to our guns.


Although I did not win my own seat, I am consoled by the strong showing our party has had across

The Hidden Drafts

Finding Them

In most homes, air escaping from the home is the greatest source of heat loss. A quick and simple way of finding invisible drafts is to take a piece of cellophane or plastic wrap and hang it from a coat hanger with a clothes pin. On a cold, windy day, pass this in front of areas where you suspect drafts. The cellophane will flutter when it meets a draft.



Sealing Them

Go to your building supply store, hardware store or local utility and ask for advice on the best products to use to seal. Remember, you want to seal the drafts from the inside.

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
