"We have no problem here," claims Home Hardware owner Mike Kinal of the downtown core. "I don't know a town in this country that has as little vacancy (as Acton). I think someone should shake the feed a little, though, and let us grow."

Kinal, who may move his business to the town's east end in two years, says there has been a fight for water and sewage in Acton since he came here 20 years ago.

"Every time water is found, it's said there's a sewage problem and vice-versa. (Government bureaucrats) just don't want Acton to grow. Until someone screams, nothing will be done," Kinal says.

Gord Dawe's building at the corner of Willow Street and Mill Street was vacant all summer, but it "has a couple of people looking at it."

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

"I think Acton is quite fortunate in that when a storefront is available, it's only empty for a short period of time," says Dawe.



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
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


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
