## Teacher has success with rare car

Norbert Axtmann will not drive his 1973 Pierre Cardin Javelin more than 2,000 miles a year.

What's fascinating about this figure is that the bulk of it is often eaten up just roaming the southern United States — searching for extra parts.

That's because Chrysler bought out American Motors Corporation in 1987 and immediately crushed all the old stock with fork lifts.

The 38-year-old Acton High technical teacher has searched high and low through various wrecking yards and says that every AMC part has been picked clean. He adds that old AMC dealers have parts, but they usually throw them out, thinking they won't sell.

"I always seem to be sending letters out to various companies who advertise they have AMC parts," laughs Axtmann.

He recently won a "Best AMC in Show" award out of 20 in his class at the Chrysler Club Car Show in New Hamburg, Ont. It

was the first time the show was open to AMC cars.

The Brampton resident also made the trek to Columbus, Ohio last year to enter the AMX (an experimental "X" AMC) in an international meet. Norbert came home with the High Gold Medal in his class.


And for two years Axtmann was AMC Champion at Performance World, the largest custom show in Canada, held at the International Centre in Mississauga.

"I took the Acton High tech kids on a field trip there and it was a thrill to most of them. I had a display thanking them for doing the car's front suspension," remembers Axtmann.

Axtmann covets one of only 13 Pierre Cardin models in the North American registry. It's the most unique Javelin interior of all.

It was created for the 1972 AMC model year by the fashion designer. He felt people should feel like they're sitting in a living room instead of sitting in a machine.

In 1991, Axtmann and his wife
