

Acton hockey player recovering from meningitis

A Midget-Juvenile hockey player in the Acton house league program is recuperating at his Rockwood home after contracting meningococcal meningitis.

James McDougall, 16, last skated with his teammates at a Nov. 6 practice, three days before he entered Guelph General Hospital for treatment of the potentially fatal illness.

All close contacts with the Grade 11 John F. Ross High School

student were followed up two weeks ago and given the red antibiotic pill, Rifampin.

Barb Lewis, public health nurse with the communicable disease team of Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph, says that the most common incubation period of three to four days after diagnosis had long past and so had the maximum of up to 10 days.

"I don't expect any further cases to develop at all," says Lewis, who adds most, if not all of Please turn to Page 16
