## Cops may pull out of Acton?

There are rumours, unsubstantiated, but from reliable sources, that Acton is about to lose its police station and most of the officers that patrol the area. The word is that Halton Regional Police are trying to get out of their lease on the Acton station, and they will reduce staff to one village constable during the day, one during the evening, and none after midnight.

Presently, safety procedures demand that there are at least two officers on duty for all three shifts and that these are reinforced by other police from rural patrols. The Acton police will still be reinforced by rural patrols, but our Town force will be cut by two-thirds if the proposals are implemented.

Mayor Miller, who sits on the Regional Board which recommended the ruling, was unavailable at press time, so we could not get official confirmation of the cutbacks to Acton's force.


### Blood donor clinic at the Legion
