Bob McKay took a gamble and lost.

So did his Acton Redmen Junior Girls' volleyball team.

The Redmen took control at the beginning of all three matches against Burlington's M.M. Robinson Rams last Wednesday, but an inability to hold a lead and weak serving contributed to the locals' first loss (2-1) of the year.

"When we had a 10-4 lead in Game 1 I went to the subs (substitute players) and when it got to 11-8 I thought 'oh no'," said Redmen coach Bob McKay after his team dropped 15-13 and 15-7 decisions before winning 15-4 in high school play in the Acton High gym.

"Maybe I put them in too early, but this time of the year it's not too bad. It was a coaching error. It's a habit of mine and I'll take full responsibility."

The Rams forged ahead 13-11 in the opening contest and finished off the home team with two hard serves that caught Redman Jamie Davies off guard in the back

fensive or defensive rebounds," says Boycott of his 0-3 Redmen.


While the visitors passed the ball better and are improving, there's a long way to go. But there are still five games to go.
