

Whiting wants to wait on Jr. Kindergarten

The following text is taken from a letter recently sent to David Cooke, Provincial Minister of Education and Training, from Acton's Dave Whiting, Chair of the Halton Board of Education.

To the Editor,

The Ministry of Education memorandum of Nov. 19, 1993 finally clarified the position of the Ministry of Education and training on the issue of Junior Kindergarten. We used this memorandum to put in place our plans for this school year and the years ahead.

Now, much to our dismay, we are hearing rumours of an impending new memorandum from the Ministry of Education and Training on this issue. This is simply not acceptable to me as Chair of the Halton Board of Education. Another memo, which would un- tained in the memorandum of Nov. doubtedly contain new information and possibly alter the assumption we have used in planning for JK in 1997, would do little other

than muddy an already muddied situation.

Our Board, like most Ontario School Boards, is reeling under the double impact of the social contract and the need for severe fiscal restraint. There is simply no money for any new programs, particularly one for which there has been absolutely no demand in our region. As a Board, we have to plan responsibly to use our very limited resources in the best way to serve students while trying to respond to the desires of the members of our community. If you now change the ground rules on JK, you might seriously impair our ability to do both.

Also, I want to make it crystal clear that our Board does not want, and would find it very difficult, to move even partial implementation up to September 1994. We are proceeding to develop a plan that will see full implementation by 1997.

I want to let you know that I am in complete opposition to any new memorandum that changes the dates of implementation. I am asking you to allow us to continue to plan based on the information con-19, 1993. That is the correct, responsible and prudent thing to do.
