Assists went to Nick Mastro with two and Jon Newby.



## Ockenden 'optimistic' of indoor pool's fate

Gerry Ockenden is optimistic about the possibility of the Acton Indoor Pool being locked with the opening of a \$3.375 million Georgetown leisure pool.

Ata Department of Recreation and Parks public meeting in late November, Jim Morgenstern, a partner with IER Planning, Research and Management Services, said the Acton pool would get support if the level of its the after Georgetown facility opens warrants it.

"Obviously the kids want to come here or they wouldn't be swimming with us," says Ockenden, the Acton Aqua Ducks swim coach since 1987.

The Aqua Ducks have grown from 14 to 30 swimmers since last year and are grabbing medal after medal, ribbon after ribbon at each competition.

"In five years we could have 10, 40, 50 or 60 kids on the team. It's frustrating because you go through the effort to build on this and ...,' Ockenden says, referring to the proposed five to seven-year opening of the 25-metre Georgetown swimming pool.

"I'm optimistic, though. But if we have to move, it would be inconvenient. Why not put the pool in the middle of Halton Hills?"

While the 45-year-old Acton resident said the pool's lesson program seems healthy, Ockenden

knows the bottom line is numbers, but feels a local club keeps the kids off the streets and improves their school work.

"It's healthy for them, I've seen some kids' school work turn around and introverts come out of their shell," Ockenden reveals. "I try to teach them the best they can

be and life skills are a big part of

Ockenden, who has his National Coaching Certificate (NCC), level three theory and level three technical, just loves the kids. And he doesn't want the hard work of the kids and their parents, who have helped tremendously with bingos and other fundraisers, to become a faded memory.

"The kids come for the kids and the parents do bingos for the kids," states Ockenden. "Some of these kids start at age eight or nine and like what they're doing here, but how are they going to feel if someone says they can't do it anymore?"

Games will continue Friday until midnight. Action starts on

Saturday at 7 am and runs until 2 pm when the first round will be complete. Round 2 will begin at 3 pm with the last game slated for 8 pm. On Sunday, regular games start at 8 am and finish at 1 pm, minutes before the first consolation game.

The three consolation games run from 1 pm to 4 pm, while the championship matches are set for 4 pm, 5:15 pm and 6:30 pm.
