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AHS Girls' v-ball team takes third at tourney

There wasn't much difference in the Acton Redmen Junior Girls' volleyball team's third-place finish during invitational play at Oakville Trafalgar High on Friday from previous tournament showings this year.

They served and pass-served exceptionally, topped their sixteam pool and made it passed quarter-final play.

The only difference was the road

to contention—point differential. Game 1 for the Redmen was against Georgetown, who they

defeated at a mid-January tourney hosted by the Rebels and most recently, lost two of three games from in high school league play.

The locals routed their rivals to the east 15-5 in the opening match Friday, but fell 15-7 in the second

However, since both teams finished with identical 5-3 records, first place in their pool — which included Blakelock of Oakville, Bishop Reding, White Oaks and Strathroy — was determined by the Redmen's greater margin of victory in head-to-head play.

In other partial (Redmen didn't

play White Oaks) round-robin games, the Redmen split with Blakelock, 4-15 and 15-2 and Bishop Reding, 9-15 and 15-6.

"In the second game with Reding we really started to play," said Redmen coach Bob McKay on Monday.

By virtue of the top placing in their pool, the Redmen received a bye for the quarter-finals. Ironically, they faced the White Oaks Wildcats in the semis.

The Redmen were in for a test against the Wildcats, the top outfit in Halton high school's Volpe Division.

The Redmen took the opening game 15-9 before dropping the next two, 12-15 and 11-15.

To conclude round-robin action, the Redmen began moving better on the court, humbling Strathroy 15-4 and 15-5.

"I was encouraged with our team's play," said McKay of Friday's showings. "We appear to play well away from Acton. We're about five points away in each game from being competitive with most of the teams we see.

"And we're down to eight players (Jamie Davies the latest casualty for academic reasons). We don't have the largest bench in the history of man-kind."

McKay, though, was thrilled with the play of blocker Heather Trotter, who is showing more confidence with each game.

"She took charge at the net," said McKay, who added the 15year-old Trotter scored 12 straight service points against Blakelock. "She's a tremendous listener, stays within herself and has become a very dominant player."

NOTES: McKay said the experience of Nicole Hargrave will likely result in her taking over Davies's role as power-hitter.

Practice may make perfect, but not for the Acton Redmen Senior Girls' volleyball team in 1993-94.

A hussling and seemingly confident group at practice all season, the local volleyballers often clammed up and appeared to revert to their freshman years in the sport come game time.

"We could have won that game, but the girls didn't seem to want to win," says perplexed Redmen coach Bruce Andrews.

A dominating Rebels squad, which improved to 8-0 with the win, shot ahead 8-0 in the final game before Acton hit the board. It didn't matter, though, in the 15-

4 Rebel verdict.

"The girls looked frozen," says Andrews. "I think they were nervous having to play first (before the Junior team), at home and against Georgetown. They didn't move around."

Tentative play by the locals is something that has plagued the Senior unit all year.

"We weren't attacking (last Wednesday). When we did this year we played well," Andrews explains. "We should have won three or four games against teams that were comparable to us in talent."

It appeared the Redmen second-stringers would outperform their Rebel counterparts in Game 3 as they soared ahead 8-0. The Redmen became too relaxed, though, as their opponents rallied for 12 points for a 12-8 lead.
