Bowler Newell riding success of 373

Daniel Newell watched the Canadian Olympic hockey team's silver medal performance in Norway and just hours later, he bowled for gold.

The Rockwood resident recently captured the Four Steps to Stardom (Zone final) bowling tourney in Bramalea and has advanced to the Provincial finals March 20 in Scarborough.


With scores of 185, 187, 191, 197 and 203, 11-year-old Daniel finished 20 pins over his 172 Youth Bowling Council (YBC) average and defeated 10 other Bantam bowlers. He finished 40 pins ahead of the third place bowler and 10 ahead of the runner-up.

"I'm glad I stayed consistent. I was just hoping the scores weren't added wrong," Daniel laughs. "I settled down after the first game. I had a guy bowling with me who was nice and that helped."

So did his ability to block out outside noises that follow tournament play.

"I try to pretend it's regular league bowling to get the pressure off. I like tournaments," reveals Daniel, who finished second at last year's Four Steps to Stardom tournament, when he rolled a 290, the second highest game of his young six-year career on the lanes.

The youngster's personal best

was thrown only weeks before this year's zone final, a 373 — 450 is a perfect score — during the third game of his weekly YBC play at Acton Bowl.

Aside from a spare in the third frame and a five count in the 10th, it was all strikes for the Grade 5 Rockwood Centennial Public School student.

While the spare in the third frame negated his chances of a perfect score, Daniel welcomed it and figures it helped in easing the

pressure of rolling the third highest single at the Main Street house this season.

Only Acton's John Ahearn and Al Stokes, who notched a 450 and 380, respectively, have bested Daniel's effort. And they're old enough to be his father.

Daniel's mother, Sandra, was front row and centre for her son's moment of glory — acting as scorekeeper.

Frame by frame she got more excited. So much so, she stopped

scoring after the fifth frame, since strikes seemed to be the order of the day.

"She stopped at the fifth frame and I had 200. I couldn't believe it. I got a strike to start the 10th frame and everyone crowded around me. It was kind of funny," states Daniel, who also enjoys baseball, pingpong and pool. "Then everyone said 'get a strike.' I got five and heard a loud roar."

Newell points to slowing down his approach for the success he's had this year in raising his league average 24 pins from last season's 148.

"(YBC coach) Brent Dance told me I was stepping too fast and releasing the ball on my second step instead of my third. He also told me to just throw the ball straight," says Daniel, an avid collector of over 7,000 hockey and baseball cards.

Dance's advice has Daniel hitting the head pin with regularity. His delivery also allows for a slight curve, so the ball isn't chopping the head pin, but gets enough of it to achieve high scores.

"He has such a love for the sport and is always willing to pick up tips from his coaches, Brent and Barb Dance and John Wagg. He always looks forward to bowling," says Sandra.
