"I was surprised at how many past members still live in the area - most live within an hour's drive."

Some of the members went on to be prominent citizens in various fields."

Acton had its own Junior Farmers group, Actondale U.F.Y.P.O., that started in 1925 and was organized at Hugh McCutcheon's residence. There was dialogue, musical numbers and solos.

They soon conducted meetings at the Old Parish Hall, the same site where the existing hall sits, scrapbooks and re-lived memo- and proceeded to move to Lorne Hall until 1949. After a few years, the boys and girls met separately at farm homes and then had a joint meeting, where there was a speaker of note and then lunch, Sprowl recalls.

> In 1938-39, the Actondale U.F.Y.P.O. became known as the Acton Junior Farmers and in 1943-44, boys and girls had their separate executives and the name switched to the Acton Junior Farmers and Acton Junior Institute.

Over the years, the Acton group involved itself in many exchanges, sports activities and self-development programs such as public speaking, debating and recreation workshops.

They also had interclub drama competitions — making it to the provincial finals in 1971-72 and participated in livestock judging competitions.

Due to declining membership, however, Acton shut down operations of their group in 1978 and later amalgamated with the Halton Junior Farmers in the early 1980s.

"It was a fact of life. Agricultural farms were declining more and more. There weren't as many farms in Acton and there didn't seem to be a need to have two clubs," remembers Henderson, whose wife Sharon was Acton president in 1972.

On the weekend of Aug. 14 and 15, the Halton Junior Farmers are hosting the 50th anniversary of the Ontario Junior Farmers. The Agriculural Museum in Milton will be the site of the Provincial Summer Games and the reunion goes on the Sunday.




