

Celebrate Easter!

For most Christians in Acton and area, the next few days of Holy Week commemorate the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, beliefs which are at the heart of the Christian faith. Special services around the world re-live events which happened in Jerusalem almost 2,000 years ago.

Simultaneously, almost, Jews around the world are celebrating the week-long festival of Passover that commemorates the deliverance of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt more than 3,000 years ago.

They occur almost at the same time because the events are intertwined. Early Christians knew the feast of Easter as "Paschal" time, the Greek work "Pascha" derived from the Hebrew word "Pesach" meaning "passover".

Easter is called a moveable feast because the date can change from year to year. The formula is that Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the 21st of March. This was arrived at not without some controversy.

Euselirus, an early Christian writer, records a controversy in the year 190 A.D. about the right day for the celebration of Easter. A diversity already existed as early as the year 120 AD between those in Asia Minor, who kept Easter on the 14th of Nisan, the Jewish Passover, or the date arrived at by the Pope and bishops of the church who wanted it on Sunday, the date when Christ rose from the dead.

The arguments about when Easter should be celebrated are really not important any more. Even as in those times when the threat of death for being a Christian was real, today much of the Easter message has been almost lost in the secular view which looks on Good Friday as just another holiday (which oddly enough derives from the term holy day) and Easter as a time for feasting and honoring the Easter Bunny.

The word "Easter" itself is an Anglo-Saxon word from the Teutonic "Eastre, an ancient German goddess of light, but has no connection – only as a time of year when the arrival of the spring equinox was an occasion of celebration. Ancient celebrations of the spring equinox contain no trace of the significance of the Christian Easter, which commemorates the death and resurrection of Jesus.

However, many of the old spring usages, such as the use of eggs symbolizing germinating new life, and buns, which represent fruits of the earth, were retained as harmless. To change their meaning a cross was added to the buns. These are known today as hot cross buns. Christian symbols were painted on eggs and it became an art form.


So when Christians crowd into the churches of Acton and district this Easter Sunday they are celebrating, not the rites of spring or the arrival of the Easter Bunny, but the resurrection of Jesus Christ.


This has been a stumbling block for many people, not just in the present skeptical age, but through the centuries. There has been much publicity given to those who would deny the physical resurrection of Jesus and little to those who defend it — essential to Christianity.

Belief in the actual physical resurrection of Christ was certainly essential to St. Paul. A persecutor of Christians in his earlier years, Paul had a vision of Christ on the road to Damascus and became a Christian. In one of his letters to the Corinthians who were debating how anyone could rise from the dead, Paul wrote: "If there is no resurrection from the dead, then even Christ did not rise; and if Christ did not rise, then our preaching is in vain, and your faith also is in vain."

The debate continues, but for most of those who will crowd into churches around the world this Sunday, it is an affirmation that the resurrection of Christ is a profound truth. The Russian people have an Easter greeting which says it succinctly:

"Christ is risen, Christ is risen, indeed!"
