

Rock band ready to hit the stage

Rockwood band Truly Gone Fishing has already tested the waters of searching for extra members and dealt with the obligatory bad attitudes along the way.

Now it's time for the five-member alternative-rock band to take their three hours of playing material and 11 hour weekly jam sessions to area watering holes, hoping to make an impact on a thriving southern Ontario market.

"We seem to gel pretty well together and nobody has an attitude problem," states guitarist Mike Brouwer. "We're hoping to get our originals on tape, so we can sell them at concerts. "That way we'll get enough money to get a recording session."

Truly Gone Fishing came together after Brouwer phoned drummer Andy McVeigh and following "a lot of setbacks" in which a couple of members quit, the rest, as they say, is history.

Four of the five members — Brouwer, McVeigh, guitarist Mike

George and bass guitarist Dale Stewart — are former Acton High students, while Jane Gartshore, the newest member of the band, grew up in Brighton and currently attends the University of Guelph.

Truly Gone Fishing prides itself in delivering tunes to its audience that are across the board. They package cover numbers, ranging from Stevie Wonder and the Rolling Stones to current artists Smashing Pumpkins and 54-40 with six or seven original cuts.

One of the more popular questions thrown their way is the meaning behind their name.

"It's actually from a line in the Pink Floyd song, "The Trial," reveals McVeigh, 22. "We made a list of names and democratically voted on them. We thought Truly Gone Fishing was corny and catchy."

Brouwer hopes the band can catch the eyes of music lovers hook, line and sinker — when they hit the bar scene heavily in the summer.

"Our songs are all over the

board, so we don't have to worry about pigeon-holing ourselves," says 22-year-old Brouwer, a nineyear musician. "We're trying to get recognition by working the Guelph music scene."

They recently played in Georgetown, delighting a crowd of about 65 with such ditties as Squirrel Bait, Punch Down Drunk, The Void, Gloves and Needles, and Damn Clock.

Many people would think Truly Gone Fishing's chances at breaking the Canadian music scene borders on nil, seeing as they hail from small-town Rockwood. But Brouwer disagrees.

"The two best areas to make it today are Seattle and southern Ontario," he says, relaying a statement once made by rock musician Neil Young. "We're lucky to be here. The band Junkhouse came out of Hamilton and there are a lot of good bands in Waterloo.

"Look at how many Canadian bands have made it lately — The Tragically Hip and the Barenaked Ladies."

Canadian bands are going to be big, McVeigh insists. "People just haven't figured it out."

Truly Gone Fishing will play the Meeting Place on Mill Street in Acton for two shows on May 13 and 14.


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
