Town garden bigger, better in '94

It's Acton helping Acton.

That's how Joan Waldie describes our community garden.

"It's a community project, like

the Acton FoodShare. We don't apply for any government funding," says Waldie, one of two representatives from the FoodShare, which co-sponsors the garden.

Plans are underway for the second community garden, to open from May 15 to Oct. 30. Ten fami-

lies have already applied for plots in the garden on Wallace Street north of McDonald Boulevard.

Last year, there were 14 plots from young families, singles and seniors who grew vegetables, corn and even flowers on land donated by Fred Dawkins and Ron Heller.

An extra one-and-a-half to two acres of land that was manured and ploughed last fall has been added this year. Waldie figures the extra space will allow for an additional 10 plots.

People leased 25 by 25-foot plots last year, but Waldie says not everyone has to follow suit.

"The size of the plots are tailored to what the person wants.

And if the person can't afford the \$10 plot charge, they are still welcome to garden," says Waldie.

The community garden is sponsored by FoodShare, the Horticultural Society and the deacons from the Christian Reformed Church.

A fence, put up by the deacons, will be put around the gardens and water will be available. Both have been donated by the Town.

"It's a combined effort, it's healthy and a hobby. And it pays off with beautiful veggies," Waldie comments.

She adds applicants are responsible for their garden supplies and that the garden is to be organic. Also, no pets are permitted in the garden and no burning of materials is allowed.

"I'm very thrilled about it and I might even have a plot myself," Waldie says. "It's great exercise and there's nothing like fresh veggies from a garden. I wish we started this five years ago."


