
EDITORIAL

What right?

Once again a convicted murderer, out on parole after serving a partial sentence, has been charged in a serious crime in the Toronto area. And once again I'm shaking my head, frustrated with a criminal justice system that just doesn't work.

Late afternoon on Saturday, shopkeeper Henry Lobe, 66, was attacked and robbed by a man who hit him over the head with a cash register. The robber then fled Henry's Variety store, located in the west-end, but police later arrested Nicholas Janzic, 30, charging him with robbery, assault and assault causing bodily harm.

According to a report in Monday's Toronto Sun, Janzic was released from prison last July after serving 12 years and two months for a first-degree 1981 murder in Hamilton.

This brings a few questions to mind: Who actually made the decision to release Janzic last year? Someone with an actual name? Or a face? How about a family ... or an honest, hard-working 66-year-old father, just like Mr. Lobe?

More questions. Is a 12-year imprisonment really enough of a deterrent to a cold-blooded killer? How long before Janzic, if convicted of this crime, is back on the streets, threatening the safety of you and your family? What right does Mr. Janzic have to *ever again* walk the streets of our communities?

In light of recent murders in Toronto, Hamilton and Tottenham — it's all around us folks! — many citizens have spoken in favour of tougher laws and sentencing. Our own Mike O'Leary has written some compelling pieces that have exposed the insanity of the present situation.

But, as Mike wrote in his Page 7 column two weeks ago, "the impetus for change must come from elected officials like Julian Reed." That is, the impetus for change must come from you!

If you want our country's law-makers to outlaw handguns, then say so! If you want to know why convicted murderers are released before the end of their sentences, then ask! If you want Ottawa to finally get tough with Young Offenders, then tell them so!

This will be your own personal response to the craziness that's going on all around us.

You have a right. You have a reason.

the great write-up regarding the Acton Cancer Society Campaign.


