Computer crashes can't stop duo

Not even computer crashes to two Acton computers at the recent 1994 Halton Skills Olympics prevented local high school tech students from capturing two gold, two bronze and three silver medals.

The suspect machines belonged to Acton High students Dave Wray and Harch Brar, who captured a gold and bronze respectively in the Computer Aided Drafting (C.A.D.) architectural category at the event in Oakville.

Wray and 19-year-old Lisa Sanderson, who earned a gold in the manual drafting exam, are heading to the Ontario Skills Olympics at Hamilton's Copps Coliseum on May 16 and 17.

Acton High tech teacher Norbert Axtmann said on Friday that both computers were cleared of all unnecessary files and checked for viruses before the competition.

"I saw Dave becoming really agitated at his machine and that concerned me, because I knew he

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knew the program (Softplan) and that the computers had sufficient memory. But I wasn't allowed to talk to him while the competition was in progress."

Soon after, Wray's computer crashed and indicated an error message that neither he nor his teacher had ever seen.

Not 10 minutes later, Brar's computer shut down with the identical error message.

"We've run these machines three periods a day every day since September and nothing like this has ever happened," Axtmann said, adding the computers were somehow tampered with before leaving for the Olympics.

Axtmann got Brar's computer limping to 50 per cent capacity so he could finish his work, while Wray's worked at 75 per cent.

"They were limited to what they could do, but finished the exam that way. I thought they had blown their chance," said Axtmann.

The students were playing the role of draftsmen in an office. They
