
Acton was well-represented at the event as Bob and Steve Turkosz won the Senior Division title.

After the fourth frame in Game 1 of the four-game tourney, the Strouds had a pinfall of seven, thanks to two fouls. They looked at each other and decided to chat.

"Normally the foul lines aren't activated for Peewees, but they were for this tournament. In his league play at Acton Bowl, Ryan runs as fast as he can and always slides over the foul line," says his father Rick, 33. "I just told him to slow down and aim the ball rather than just firing it."

It worked as the father-son team finished the day with an 879 pin count, seven pins ahead of the runner-up tandem.

"I didn't expect to come out of the house league tourney and was extremely surprised with this win," continues Rick. "I wouldn't be the least surprised if we finish last at the Provincials, but if Ryan bowls well, we'll do well."

"My performance wasn't anything close to the other parents," Rick says. "If the kids bowl well at this age level, you'll do well.

"I'm happing to see Ryan do well. He likes to compete, but when he's losing he doesn't let it bother him. And when he needs to do well, he does."

Like in the last week of league bowling recently when the first-year bowler carrying a 94 average rolled a 164 and 150 for a 314 double. The Robert Little student's personal best prior to the season finale was 250.

"I like the fun of the sport," says Ryan, "and seeing the pins fly like helicopters."

The Spartans finally put the ball past Redmen keeper Carrie Ferguson at the 23-minute mark to tie the game 2-2 and seven minutes later potted the game-winner.

The Redmen were caught running around their end and the Spartans soon capitalized as Cheryl Wisson scored her third goal of the game, drilling the ball to the left side past Ferguson.

I thought we could have won the game when it was 2-1," Bailey said. "I gave the girls instructions to defend the lead and I thought we could have."
