Call it the Battle of the Wind.

The story of the Acton Redmen-Milton Mustang Junior soccer matchup last Wednesday was the gusts that blew across the soccer field at Milton District High.

While the second-year Junior coach admits inexperience played a part in the failed comeback attempt, Bain feels the game was decided after the Stangs second goal when his players "got down on themselves."

"After their second goal there was a 10-minute period when the boys didn't play well," Bain says, "but they came back in the last 10 minutes and had their chances.

"We had lots of good kicks, but in the wind you have to keep them low. If you start hoofing the ball in the air the wind will catch it."

It didn't help that Scott McIntyre, a cornerstone on the Redmen defence, received a yellow card during the game. It was the second of the young season for McIntyre, who drew an automatic suspension for today's (Wednesday) game at Assumption against the Crusaders.

Bain was pleased with the work of defencemen Todd Chumley and James Metcalfe, left half Derrick McIntyre, goaler Phil McIntyre and the fact the players worked as a team.

The Redmen bench boss is hoping his players continue to play as a team, play strong defence and score goals against a speedy and talented Crusader squad.



Bike safety continues!

This week I will finish up with my bike safety tips for spring. I will then add some by-laws all riders should be aware of and obey.

1. Bicycle drivers, when approaching a railway crossing, shall obey gates and signals.

2. Bicycle drivers shall not attach themselves or their bicycle to any other vehicle on the roadway.

3. Bicycle drivers shall not carry another person on their bicycle unless the bicycle is designed to accommodate more than one.

By-Laws

- 1. Bicycle drivers must not leave their bicycles laying on a sidewalk, placed against a store window, or across the entrance to a building.
- 2. Bicycle drivers must use both hands on handlebars except when signalling.

3. Bicycle drivers shall drive in single file only.

4. Bicycle drivers shall not drive their bicycles on sidewalks or pathways used by pedestrians.


