Acton in Top 20 for Terry Fox Run

Actonites—take a minute and pat yourselves on the back.

Those who participated in the 1993 Terry Fox Run at Acton High in September will be happy to hear that Acton again cracked the top 20 community run site listings of Ontario, placing 17th and raising \$23,026.

Leathertown finished 13th in community runs per capita at \$3.34 and the telling story for participants, a fifth-place sitting in the community run site per participant category at \$153.51.

"It's tough to be in the running for top 20 with participation from big sites in Toronto, Ottawa, London and Kitchener," says Acton run organizer Jon Hurst, who recently obtained the provincial rankings.

"It's refreshing to know you're in the top 20, and it's a testament to Acton again.

"Acton has been supportive year after year."

The money raised from the 1993 run, which attracted 130 to 140 people who ran, walked, jogged and strolled, pushes the Acton total to almost \$230,000 in 13 years.

"When we first started the run, people figured it would last four or five years and fade away, but each year it has developed and has even grown internationally," offers

Hurst, who mentions 34 countries outside Canada hosted 260 Terry Fox Runs and raised \$1.3 million in 1993.

Hurst says Acton has always been at the top of its potential and seems to over-achieve each year. He added this is only one of the many reasons the local run is approaching its 14th year.

"That, the image and memory of Terry Fox," Hurst continues, "and the fact so many people are touched by cancer with family and friends. We have to try and do what we can to eliminate cancer."

Also, the fact people know the money pledged is going directly to the innovative types of research (the doctors) makes one hope the chances of a cure will accelerate.

This year's 10-kilometre run (25 laps around the Acton High track) is set for Sept. 18.

"We (the run committee) would like to maintain a high standard that we've set year after year and surpass it if possible," says Hurst, who would like to see 225 participants for the 1994 run.
