The father-son duo, who led by 100 points heading to the final game, finished with a pin count of 1,180 with handicap, averaging 240 in the four-game tourney.



## Shortage of experienced players fatal for Senior Redmen

Having only five players on the field with soccer experience in a matchup with the Bishop Reding Royals on Thursday, Acton Redmen Senior Girls' coach Steve Bailey wasn't expecting much.

His hunch quickly became a reality as the Redmen spotted the visitors a 3-0 lead in the first half en route to an 8-0 thumping before a sparse gathering at McKenzie-Smith in high school action.

The home side was missing arguably its two top offensive threats in Janisse Bailey, who was visiting Brock University, and Shelby DaPonte, who injured her ankle in

last Tuesday's game at Milton District High.

As a result, the 0-3 Redmen pelted the Royals keeper with a handful of shots throughout the contest, two of which were driven from about 65 yards out.

"We didn't have any forwards and there was mass confusion on defence. I even put the fast defensive players up front late in the game to try and score," said Steve tailing off in frustration.

"But at least the girls are getting experience and exposure to the game, so I can't be displeased or disheartened by that."

The Royals scored by either

using their speed to blow by Redmen defenders or working feverishly to win possession of the ball in scrums in front of home keeper Carrie Ferguson, who was often caught out of position.

"This was an 8-year-old game today with scrambles in front of the net," blasted Bailey. "It's just kick and run out there, because the girls don't carry the ball."

"They're not that strong a team, Bailey after the game, his voice but they played hard," praised Royals coach Joe Golini, whose team evened its record at 2-2. "With only 10 players on the field and no bench they were running out of gas. We also had the wind to our advantage in the second half,

so everything was working to our advantage."

Last Tuesday, the Redmen had to battle horrible field conditions and a tough referee on the road in losing 6-0 to the Milton Mustangs.

Bailey said the field dipped so much it looked like his players were surfing, while daughter Janisse had her mouth cut open. She failed to draw a penalty after taking an elbow to the mouth from a Mustang player who had left her feet to deliver the blow.

"He (the referee) didn't see it or call it," said Bailey, visibly miffed two days after the game. "It was the worst refereed game I've seen in my life. He shouldn't be ref-

ereeing more than 10-year-olds ... I told him to retire after the game."

Luck wasn't with the Redmen on the scoreboard, either. They had three breakaways and were unsuccessful each time. However, Bailey said, the defence played well."

"A lot better than it did (Thursday)," he said.

Catherine Kemp scored three goals for the Royals. Singles went to Natalie Cameron, Kristy Hickey, Viviana Gerace, Noreen Ortilla and Jackie Shaw.

The Redmen travelled to Lord Elgin yesterday (Tuesday) and host Assumption tomorrow. Game time is 3:30 pm at McKenzie-Smith.
