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

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

NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE HIGHWAY 25, ACTON TO OSPRINGE

THE STUDY

The Ontario Ministry of Transportation is holding a Public Information Centre to provide an opportunity for the public to review proposed improvements to Highway 25 from the former North limit of Acton, Northerly to the intersection at Highway 24 in Ospringe, a total distance of 9.4km.



Various alternatives are being considered to improve the level of safety on Highway 25 and at the intersection of Highways 24 and 25 at Ospringe. Subject to the final outcome of the study, including consideration of comments received at the Public Information Centre, the Ministry is proposing:

 Resurfacing and lane widening of Highway 25 and construction of 0.5m partially paved shoulders from the former North limit of Acton, Northerly to the intersection at Highway 24 in Ospringe;

· Geometric improvements and signalization at the intersection of Highway 25 and Highway 24 in Ospringe;

· Construction of a new Westbound truck climbing lane, Highway 24, from 0.2 km West of Highway 25 at Ospringe, Westerly for 0.6km;

• The two pipe arch culverts at the Eramosa River will be lengthened to accommodate the wider proposed cross-section of Highway 25;

Existing guiderail will be updated to current standards and new guiderail will be installed in accordance with current hazard protection warrants where required;

· Minor improvements to intersections on Highway 25 at Wellington County Road 50 and at Wellington County/Region of Halton Bound-

· Adding mountable curb and gutter in areas of steep grades;

· Minor drainage improvements including ditching will be carried out as required;

· Regrading of sideroads and entrances, replacing or relocating entrance culverts, and upgrading of commercial entrances, as required, to accommodate the pavement and shoulder widening;

Applying snow drifting treatments at three locations.

THE PROCESS

This study is following an approved planning process with the opportunity for public input throughout. An initial notice regarding the project was placed in local newspapers during the week of July 26, 1993. Upon completion of the study, an Environmental Study Report will be available for public review and comment. Another notice will be published at that time.
