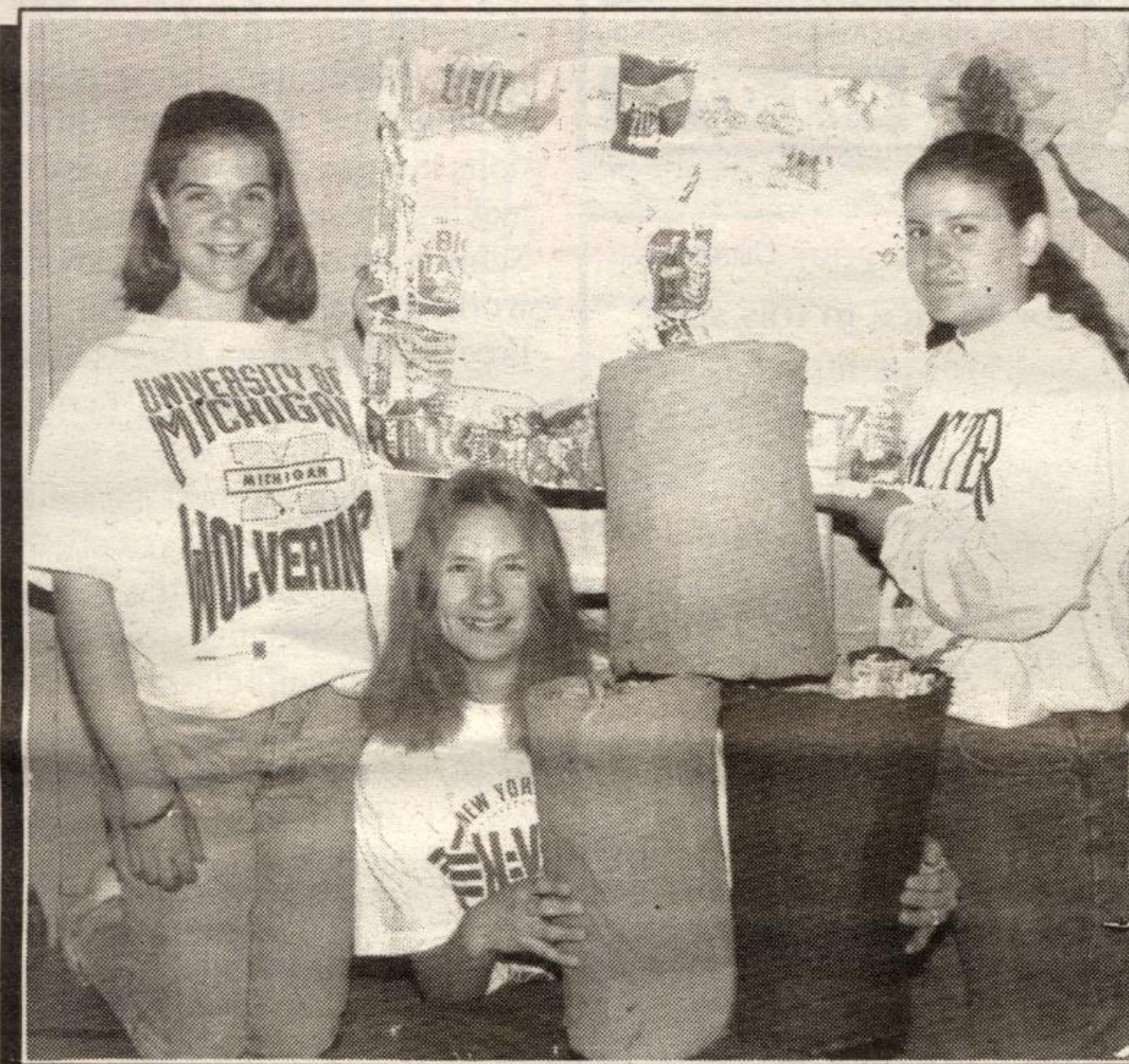

Watch your medication, ASSIC urges

ASSIC ALERT

Medication should be stored in a cool dry place, preferably not in the bathroom. Heat and humidity can cause drugs to spoil quickly.

Be sure to read medication labels carefully. When alcohol is mixed with certain medications,

the effect can be dangerous.

Always inform your doctor of all the medications you are taking, even the ones that you can buy without a prescription. Combining some drugs can be harmful.

Any medication that has been opened for one year or longer should be discarded.

Try to use only one pharmacy — the pharmacist will have a record of all the medications that you are taking.

Of course, keep all medication out of children's reach.

To ensure that mishaps do not occur, be wise, play it safe, and use some common sense.

for I noticed that after the tree fell, there was funereal pause as when the coffin is lowered in the grave."

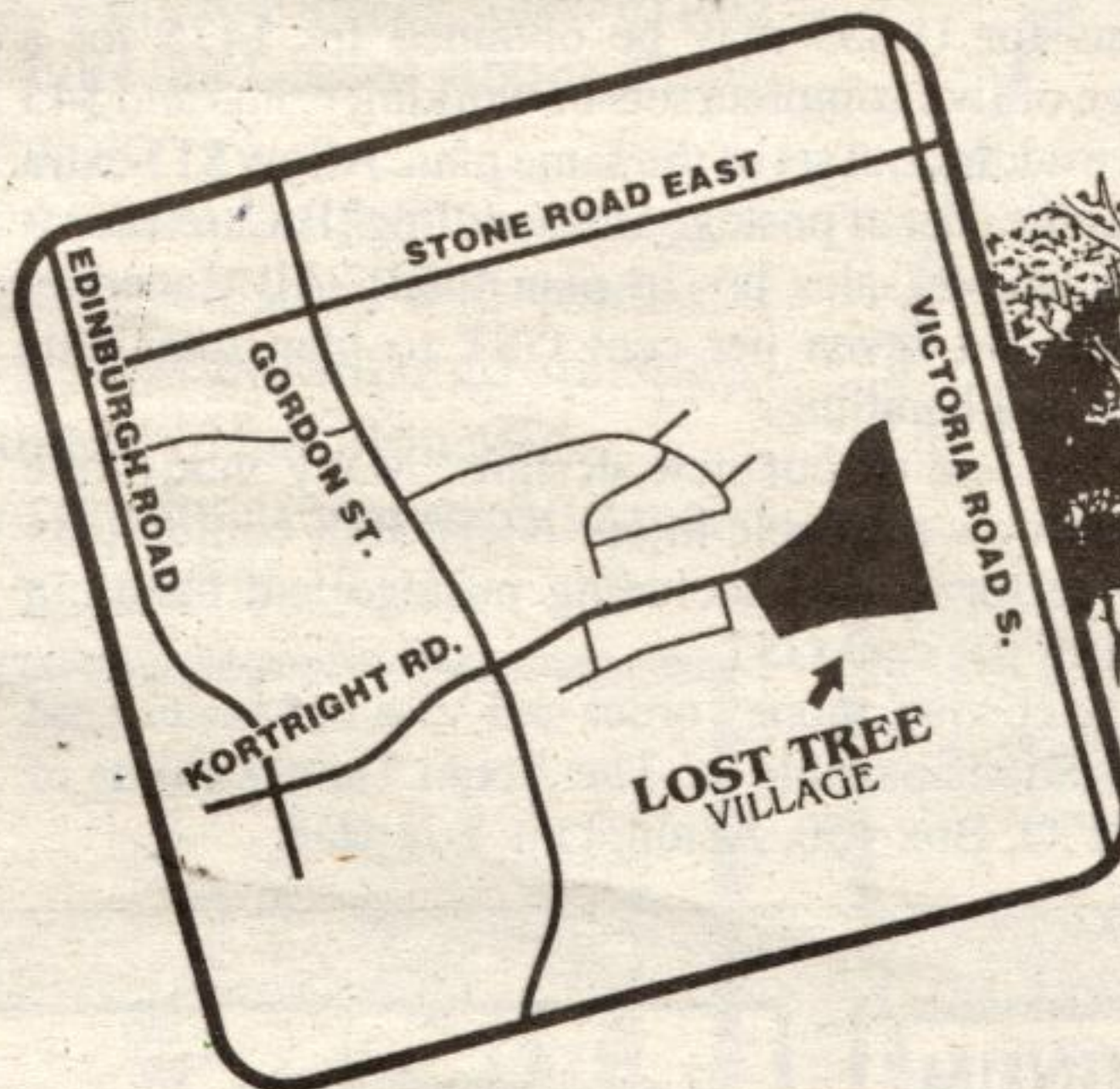

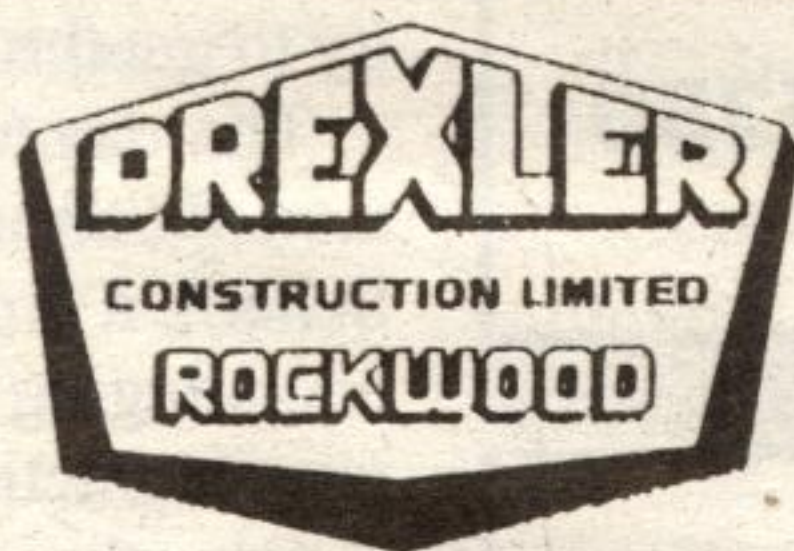
