Friday the 13th strikes again

Sometimes, the exuberance of youth can contribute to a cause-and-effect situation that our kids would never want to happen. Such a condition occurred on the evening of Friday, May 13.

The Acton Tanner reported last week that Councillor Rennie was preparing a report on a "loud and raucous" house party that was held in town. He is looking at the police response and numbers of celebrants.

I would like to tell you about an accident that occurred that night and how this type of party can have spin-off consequences that none would think of.

Several of the neighbours were out on their porches that evening watching the comings and goings. There was a certain tension building, which is only natural when a party involving between 100-150 kids is happening in a usually quiet neighborhood.

When the police arrived, some of the kids scattered and started to run into nearby back yards. Running between houses, a couple banged into a metal trailer and made a heck of a racket. This was

One homeowner, concerned that his property or car was being vandalized, started off the porch. His wife followed him. She slipped on the steps and plunged several feet to the flagstone walk. She scraped up her face and hands pretty good but the most serious damage was done to her knee-cap.

That night, this gentle lady underwent over three hours of surgery. A piece of her thigh bone had to be grafted onto her knee in an effort to rebuild it. She was a week in the hospital, will be six weeks or so on crutches with physiotherapy to follow. Like I said, cause-and-effect.

I don't contend for one minute that the kids at that party wanted this to happen or would knowingly cause the accident. We have, generally speaking, good kids in this town. I doubt that there are 100 bad kids in all of Acton and district and they weren't all on

The homeowners are both lifelong Acton residents and, I'm proud to say, friends of mine. The lady is shy and didn't want to have her name used. She doesn't want to become the centre-piece of the ongoing investigation regarding the party and is quick to point out that the two incidents are not related. She doesn't blame the kids—I think she blames herself and I wish she wouldn't.

Why do these things always happen to the best of us? My friend is a wife, mother and grandmother, in addition to being a caring and generous member of our community. After this year's vicious winter, both she and her husband were looking forward to summer and more good times at their cottage.

I know it'll take more than a bum knee to keep her down—she'll handle this the same way she has handled other obstacles in life. She will draw on her inner strength, borrow some encouragement from family and friends and carry on with life on her terms. Where some would perceive this injury as a barrier, she'll consider it little more than a speed bump. (Top that Karen!)

Perhaps some good can come out of this incident if kids will learn that sometimes situations can escalate out of control. If your young ones were at this party on Friday the 13th, make them aware of this accident. There is a good opportunity here for parents to discuss private property with our young and to also graphically illustrate what can happen when we don't have respect for the rights of others.


Jackie, in her bloodstained pink suit, seemed to give us all a lift. If she could carry on, could we do less?
