## Campbellville celebrates Main Street renovation

The Village of Campbellville and the surrounding area is alive and well after almost a year of Main Street renovation. To mark the occasion, members of various community groups have organized the first annual community-wide spring celebration.

Co-ordinated by the Campbellville Area Business Association, the event is scheduled for the weekend of June 11 and 12 and will promote the services, activities and special features of the Village to residents and visitors.

"The reconstruction in Campbellville has been a long process and it has been difficult for both businesses and residents in the area. The CABA thought that the community needed an opportunity to congratulate itself for its patience and visitors needed an opportunity to see the many changes and to realize that the Campbellville community is alive and more active than ever," said Ken Moore, CABA Chair.

One of the highlights of the event will be the Region of Halton's Official Opening of the Guelph Line through the Village of Campbellville, to be held on Saturday, June 11 at 11 am with a

ribbon cutting ceremony and greetings from local officials.

Other events scheduled over the two days include: a pancake breakfast, pony and paddle boat rides, face painting, sidewalk sales, a slow-pitch ball game between Milton's RCMP detachment and Milton's Town Council and staff, a parade, an antique car display and a dance.

Some of the community groups involved are the Campbellville and Nassagaweya Historical Societies, heritage Milton, Campbellville Area Brownies and Guides, Halton Region conservation Authority, Campbellville Women's Institute, the Campbellville Fire department, the Campbellville Lion's Club, the Campbellville Baseball Club and the Ebenezer United, St. David's Presbyterian and St. John's Anglican Church Women.

In addition to beautifying the Village, the reconstruction has improved the road safety by widening Main Street, reducing the grade on the hill south of the railway tracks and increasing curbside parking. Significant cosmetic changes included ornamental street lighting, interlocking brick parking and walkway area and increased planting of shrubs.
