Concerns over Acton apartment building

Acton Councillor Norm Elliott is concerned the Town may be liable if building and fire code violations at an Acton apartment building lead to an accident.

Elliott raised his concerns as Council received a Committee of Adjustment report regarding a building on Queen Street.

A fire inspection uncovered two unregistered units in the building, which was limited to eight units.

"The Committee of Adjustment report indicates some possible deficiencies in the building code. Have staff looked at the Town's legal position in allowing certain infractions or deficiencies to continue?" Elliott asked at last Tuesday's Council meeting.

Elliott wants the problems dealt with now.

"It seems to me that if there is an existing breach of our own municipal regulations then we should examine our own position on the matter," Elliott said.

"Are we going to sit on this when other municipalities are having fires in unregistered apartments? Now that we know about, shouldn't we be doing something?"

Town By-law Enforcement Officer Ron Stein said in an inter- Midway fee waived view on Friday that the problem is getting into the building to do an inspection.

"The building department doesn't have any authority to go in there and inspect. Unless there is a building permit issued we can't go in. We can't address any building code issues until there is a request for a building permit," Stein said.

Weed woes

Acton Library is still an overgrown eyesore.

Last Tuesday night at Town Council Elliott complained that the town property was a sea of dandelions.

"I know we have budget concerns about when we cut grass but there very few properties that are owned by the municipality that have high profile," Elliott explained.

"There is a historic plaque near the Library and a garden dedicated by the Acton Horticultural Society in memory of Laura Dittrich. The Society has done a wonderful job maintaining the garden but when I came by there today it was a sea of yellow," Elliott said.

Elliott felt the unkempt appearance gave a "bad overall view of how we maintain our properties."

"I felt a little bit embarrassed today that anybody driving by would look and say that it was being maintained by the Town," Elliott said.

The dandelions and grass were cut the next day but by Sunday night new weeds had sprung up and the piles of mowed grass left by the Town was browning and blowing around.

Organizers of the Acton Fall Fair will save \$600 dollars, thanks to Town Council.

At last Tuesday night's meeting Councilors agreed to waive the licensing fee for the Fair's midway on Sept. 16, 17 and 18.

The Town's usual fee is \$200 dollars per day.

Town staff says the licensing fee can be waived if proceeds from the event are used for religious, charitable, philanthropic or patriotic purposes.

Council has waived the fee for both the Acton and Georgetown fairs for the past few years.
