She says her pupils have improved significantly during their three-day-a-week classes at St. Alban's Parish Hall since September. It showed recently as 13 of them had exams in April and excelled.

"The girls really enjoyed performing in An Evening of Original

Music and Dance," Keith says of the show that coupled the talents of the Acton School of Dance with the Acton Music Studio. "A lot of their time is spent in the classroom and it's nice for them to show what they can do."

Of the 64 dancers, only one is male. Keith, who has danced she was 6, isn't surprised, but wishes more young boys would join the school.


"There's a lot of prejudice against boys dancing. Fathers tend to think they should play soccer, hockey or baseball. But what they don't realize is dancing is just as athletic as sports. Plus, the girls love having boys dance in the class, she says."

This summer, Keith will teach at the Royal Academy of Dance and will soon be itching to put what she learns there to practice.

"But about now I feel the need to regroup," reveals Keith.
