

## Murr Memorial marks 'Year 10' on Monday



#### Where does Branch 197 stand on this?

To the Editor,

The executive of the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) has recently made a formal decision to enable its branches to continue to deny entry to those who, for religious reasons, are unwilling to remove their head-dress. This decision has created a major setback for religious and racial tolerance in this country. In making it, the executive has demonstrated a lack of sensitivity, hypocrisy and coward-

They were insensitive because they did not make the effort to understand the deeply-felt motivation of many Sikhs and Jews against removing their turbans and yarmulkes. If they had, they would have understood that it is not nearly as trivial an issue as a Christian taking off his baseball cap.

They were hypocritical because, by prefixing the word "Royal" to their name, they are automatically affirming their servitude to the Queen. Her Majesty, as we all know, is honoured to receive distinguished subjects of Sikh, Jewish and other religious persuasions in their religious head-gear. She does this out of respect for their beliefs and customs and would not dream of dishonouring or humiliating them by asking them to remove them. It is too bad that the RCL executive has not displayed the same good judgment.

They were cowardly because they hid behind the rigid concept that removing one's head-dress is know with whom I am sharing my a mark of respect for their fallen comrades. Certainly the RCL is correct in demanding such respect.

No true Canadian, be they Christian, Sikh, Jew, or otherwise would want anything but the highest level of respect to be offered to those who gave their lives to protect our freedom, peace and way of life.

However, it is obvious that asking a Sikh to remove his turban, or a Jew to remove his yarmulke, does not achieve this objective. Instead, it creates great offense to them and to their beliefs. In fact, this is a thinly-disguised expression of racial and religious bias, which is unbecoming to the RCL.

Unfortunately, we cannot simply write this off as an act of bad judgment. The RCL has always been looked up to by the people of Canada as an elite group, representing those who know what it is like to face death in the defense of their country. They are regarded as being the ultimate patriots. When they make a decision so offensive to a segment of our population, including some of their own comrades, the whole concept of patriotism and respect for our country's ideals is dealt a heavy

However, all is not lost! The RCL executive has left it up to the discretion of the local branches to decide whether or not they would impose this regulation of religious intolerance.

As a citizen of Acton, I would like to know where the Acton branch of the RCL stands with respect to this latest decision of their executive. Are you going to follow in their footsteps, or are you going to do what is right for your fellow citizens and comrades? Are you going to fight for freedom and democracy on one hand and dish out intolerance and insensitivity on the other?

I hope the Acton branch of the RCL responds. I would like to community.
