Explore the process of human visual perception at the Ontario Science Centre's "Seeing Brain" exhibition at the Wellington County Museum. This hands-on, eyes-on exhibition which allows visitors to examine the way the human eye functions in concert with the brain will continue until July 17.

The Museum will be holding its annual Strawberry Social on Sunday, June 26, from 12 to 5 pm. The day will include a live concert in

the Victorian Garden from 1 to 3 pm and a special display of collections by our Museum volunteers.

In the large exhibit hall you can participate in the hands-on activities of the "Seeing Brain," a travelling exhibit from the Ontario Science Centre, as well as old fashion outdoor games such as croquet and horseshoes.

The four separate weeks in July
