

I feel the above-mentioned article was one-sided and painted a very bleak picture of Bruce Chapman's "Rocky Ridge Ranch." This was unfair.

My family has utilized this ranch for nine years and we have never once had a concern or complaint about the housing or any other aspect of the ranch. The food is always top notch, the accommodations excellent and the service and comfort of the visitors always A-1. Patrons' safety has always been a number one consideration of the Chapmans.

Lima's statement: "We assume that if students are going on an overnight trip with the school, the place has been inspected by fire and health officials. The Board of Education assumes that if a camp is running, it too has been inspected," is totally misleading.

Of course the ranch has been inspected. The Chapman family always has the inspections neces-

sary to protect the visitors as well as themselves. To imply anything else is totally ludicrous.

The Board of Education would not continue to associate with a business, let alone send our children there, if it were not an excellent and safe environment. To suggest that the Board of Education just assumes a place is safe is a very negligent assumption.

This trip was not the first one to Rocky Ridge Ranch by schools. Other classes from other schools have also utilized this ranch for overnight trips. They would not continue to take our children there if there was a problem with the safety of our children.

The above-mentioned article did not speak about the impeccathis incident. It did not mention the number of students who have visited the ranch and were totally pleased with the conditions and trips. There was no mention of any other parents who sent their child to the ranch and who liked what they saw.

Just recently I was speaking with a mother whose son went on this exact trip last year. She raved about the trip and the accommodations. This too should have been mentioned in your article. In not doing so, this article paints an unfair and inaccurate picture of an excellent business.

Rocky Ridge Ranch is and always has been a wonderful and safe place for day or overnight trips. I highly recommend this place to anyone.

Hats off to Bruce Chapman and his family for providing a wonderful and safe place to enjoy nature.
