A review of Regional government determined that, because of high population growth in the south of the Region, there should be more Regional Council representatives from the south.

The review suggests that Halton Hills, which now has five Regional Council members, should only have four.

Led by the three Acton councillors, who fear it will be the lone Acton representative that would be lost, Town Council voted Monday to take no action on the suggested changes but to review the Regional representation report following November's municipal election.

United Way wraps up good year

In spite of the poor economy, the Halton Hills United Way exceeded its \$180,000 fund-raising goal by almost \$7,000 in 1993.

The United Way ran two fundraising campaigns — Campaign East in Georgetown and Acton's Campaign West. Each campaign was headed by its own chair and carried out fund-raising programs aimed at meeting the specific needs of each community.

The committee met last summer and agreed to split the campaigns to accommodate the Acton-Georgetown competitive spirit.

"Robin Elliott ably took the chairperson's position for Campaign West," noted general campaign chair Bob Malcolmson in his campaign report at the annual general meeting last Wednesday.

"Robin and her committee, all from Acton, developed a positive approach and raised the awareness in the community by having a store front display."

The West team of Elliott, campaign chair David Pyke and Janet Goy helped the United Way get back on track in Acton.

The local United Way generated a revenue of \$220,570 for the 1993-94 fiscal year. That was an increase of \$23,570 over the amount forecasted after last year's campaign.

The cumulative surplus at the end of the year is \$127,728, representing an increase of \$40,980 over last year. Of this amount, \$40,000 has been transferred to the reserve fund in past years to provide ongoing financing of the allocations and operations of the United Way and provide a contingency fund when campaign targets are not met.

United Way president John Oliver commended the efforts of Malcolmson and Elliott in is re-

port. He feels through the efforts of past campaigns and in particular, the recent efforts of the pair, the United Way's fund-raising capacity has been strengthened.

"Under the leadership from Bob and Robin, the United Way has established a strong presence in both Georgetown and Acton. They have managed to recognize the distinct elements of our community and yet retain a central Halton Hills focus for the overall campaign," Oliver reports in his yearend report.

A successful project for the 1993 campaign was the eight-foot high thermometer in Acton. It was regularly updated throughout the October and November to highlight "rising" contributions.

Also, for the first time, the United Way participated in the Acton and Georgetown Santa Claus parades.
