"The village was first called Danville, which name was derived from a young man who was a clerk in the first dry goods store, established here by Wheeler Green. The first grocery store was established by Miller Hemstreet, who set up the first sign post in the community, bearing the wording Danville Grocery, by Miller Hemstreet.

"Adamsville was the next name

the community bore. This name was derived from the first settlers here, Zenas, Rufus and Ezra Adams."



reported as saying. Mr. Chainsaw was recently released on a \$263 bond.

As an expression of Canada's apology for past treatment, Mr. Chainsaw was given \$4-million in cash, Mulroney's old DC-10, a Buick, a charge account at Lulu's House of Pleasure and the keys to 24 Sussex

"All Canadians are embarrassed with our treatment of immigrantcriminals," Herewego said. "I hope the actions of my government will prove once and for all that we are trying very hard to attract and keep the worst criminals we can find. We have observed that honest, hard working people tend to criticize politicians and we've had enough of that. Hardened criminals hardly ever criticize the government," he observed.

(Montreal)—Butch Lesard, Separatist leader, today declared that, should his party win the 22nd annual referendum, Quebec will separate from North America. "Europe is where the action is," he said, "and there's a whole bunch of other people who speak French and stuff over there.
