Acton cyclist heading to Commonwealth Games

Tim Hadfield was part of the Ontario team that won a gold medal recently at the Canadian National Cycling Track championships in Calgary. Later, he added a personal best time of 52 minutes, 19 seconds in the 40-kilometre individual time trial event at the road nationals in Edmonton.

And that, in one sense, is the bad news.

The good news came when the 22-year-old Acton cyclist was notified he'd been selected to compete in the Commonwealth Games in Victoria, B.C., in late-August.

"He placed fairly well (in both Calgary and Edmonton), but didn't medal in other events," said his

mother, Pauline Hadfield, on Mon-tense, training on the track. day. She added Tim finished ei-

ther tied for third or fourth in the points standings.

"Politics always comes into play, so you never know what cyclers the Commonwealth Games selection committe is going to pick, unless you're first or second," Pauline continued.

Only seven weeks ago, Tim broke the iliac crest in his left hip and six ribs riding in a 65km international road race in Nagoya, Japan.

Just three weeks after the incident, a quick-healing and determined Tim was riding a stationary bike for an hour. In late June, he spent two weeks with the provincial team in Allentown, Pennsylvania for short distance, but in-


He came home just days before the Canadian National finals and seemed optimistic of his chances to ride in Victoria. His parents (father Richard), though, didn't seem to share the same feeling.

"The announcement was more a relief than anything," said Pauline. "At the beginning of the season he was riding strong, but after the accident I wasn't confident he would be selected.

"But he deserves it. He's put a lot into it and it's not easy. To place that well in Calgary after an injury says a lot."

She added Tim approached the director of the Commonwealth Games selection committee after being notified and told him he appreciated their confidence in him, despite a recent setback.

"We're going out there (to Victoria)," Pauline said, "to obviously cheer on the Canadians, but it's nice when your son's in it."

Andy's slow start was a carry over from last Tuesday's contest in Campbellville, eventually won 7-3 by Andy's.


Campbellville led 1-0 after two frames, despite Scully fanning three batters.


