Cat-burglar on the prowl?

Little Margaret Bowes has had trouble sleeping the last 10 days. She's often waiting up for her little Smokey to come through a window at her family's Kingham Road residence.

"She thinks he's found a girlfriend and he'll return when he dumps her. She's devastated. Smokey was her baby," said Janet Lelievre, Margaret's mother, last week.

Two weeks ago, Smokey, a neutered male cat, wandered from the Lelievre residence like many cats are wont to do. However, when the sun started to fall, the black, short-haired feline with a white streak down the centre of its face didn't return.

"He's 10-years-old. He would not have walked off the property," said Lelievre. "He hasn't done that in years, because he's getting older."

This is just one in a series of recent incidents in the Kingham-Greenore-Cobblehill area, where at least three cats have vanished without a trace.

"Maybe it's the economic climate," Lelievre guessed. She said a couple of others went missing the same day. "It's a quick buck for somebody if they want to sell them, especially under the table. Somebody probably wants healthy animals for research."

However, Anne Burr, supervisor at the Erin-Hillsburgh and District Humane Society, said Monday that the Animal Research Act

forbids animals to be sold for research without paperwork showing their origin.

Lelievre, who has since given her 7-year-old daughter another cat to soften the blow of losing Smokey, said some of her neighbours don't let their cats out. If they do, the cats are put on a harness.

"When you see people doing that you think it's cruel. But when you think what's going on now ..." Lelievre said she's had about five calls from people who thought they spotted Smokey.

Burr mentioned she received three calls last week concerning area cats. She doesn't think there's much of a pattern, since one had been missing for four weeks and another for five to six days.

Another came from a girl who said her grandmother had been feeding neighbouring cats and they disappeared without her knowing others had vanished as well.

Julia Prentice, who lives just south of Kingham Road on Hwy. 25, has also lost her 11-pound orange-white neutered male cat, who has no collar or tags.

"I know coyotes are over-populated this year and they're hungry ... the most terrifying part is not knowing whether the cat is still walking around or if something has happened to it," she said.

"There really isn't too much of a pattern here," Burr confirmed. "If you live in a rural area, cats can be eaten by a fox or a coyote. We suggest that cats not be allowed outside, unless they're on a harness," confirmed Burr, adding "if people would only get their cat tatooed they would get them back quicker.

"If people don't want their animal to wander or get lost they can make sure of that."

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
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
