In recent action, Subway was doubled 26-13 by a hot-hitting Glen Williams club at Prospect Park. McKay went 2-for-2 with

home run and a walk. McKay then excelled on the mound to down Kilbride on the road 22-14. It was sweet revenge for the locals who fell 30-12 to Kilbride a night earlier.

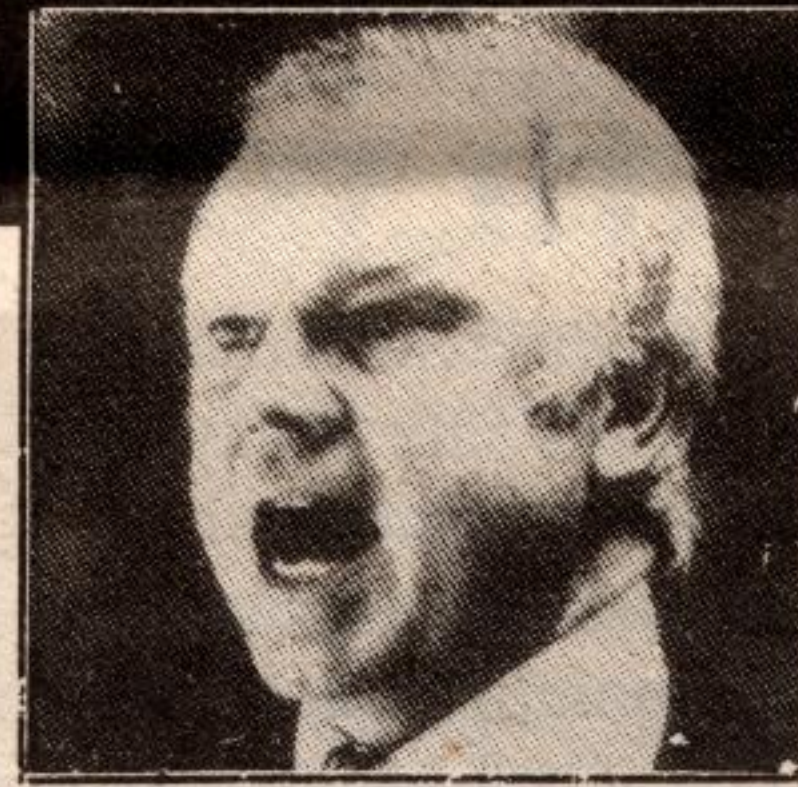
