A major Acton employer, BPCO Inc. hopes its new \$2.5 million raw material blending facility will be operating by the New Year.

Commune engineering manager Kevin Conroy said the hightech facility — a 50-foot silo-like building — will allow the company to more accurately and quickly mix the materials used to produce vinyl siding at its plant on Highway 25, north of Acton.

As in the past, members of the Halton Hills site plan committee allowed BPCO to exceed the bylaw that would have restricted the blending building to a maximum of 30 feet.

MacMillan's expands

A major expansion at MacMillans Frozen Foods in Acton will mean the hiring of four additional staff at the Hwy. 7 facility..

After eight months of planning and negotiating with at least one neighbour, construction is underway on a new warehouse that will double the existing facility.

Following an on-site visit to MacMillan's last month, the Town's site plan committee said six additional tress would have to be plants as a visual buffer for a neighbour who claimed the expanded warehouse would de-value his property by \$35,000 to \$40,000 dollars.

How to be heard

In an effort to have fairer and more streamlined meetings, Council has changed its rules for people wishing to speak at Council and General Committee meetings.

Spearheaded by Acton Coun-

cillor Gerald Rennie, one of the main changes involves when cer-

tain delegations can speak.

"People who are not on the printed agenda, or want to speak to an item on the agenda will now have to wait until the end of the meeting instead of being able to speak at the beginning," Rennie explained on Thursday.

"Some people who were on the agenda were having to wait until 10:30 or 11 at night to be heard because of last-minute delegations that took a lot of time.

"In order to be fair we will now deal with the matters on the agenda first and then at the end of the meeting we will deal with new speakers."

The policy also requires speakers to an item not on the agenda to supply Council with a written outline of their presentation.

Weed Woes

CN Rail will be asked to clean up its act when it comes to cutting the weeds on its rail-side property in Acton.

Last week both Acton Councillors Norm Elliott and Gerald Rennie complained about shoulder-high weeds on the property and asked staff to call CN officials and pass on the complaints.

Councillor Rennie called the property an eye sore.

"I was so disgusted with the look of that parking lot that on the morning of the Leathertown Festival I went out with the shears and cut the weeds as best I could," Rennie said.

"I felt that visitors would take one look at the weeds and think we were raggy people and that's not the image we want to present."




