In the end, tearing his left sartorius muscle has become a pain in the butt for Brent Edwards.

The Canadian Junior long jump champ sustained the injury, which covered the area from his hip to the inside of the tibia, at the Ontario relay championships at York University in early June.

The most frustrating part about his rehabilitation has been guaging his return to live action.

Soon after the relay event, Edwards hinted of a return to competition two weeks later for a twi-light meet at York, but it became more clear participation in the Ontario Bantam-Midget-Junior (BMJ) championships at the end of July was more likely.

However, the 168-pounder was a no-show for both.

"Any injury is pretty bad, but I thought I'd be back in two weeks and then it stretched to three and then four," Edwards, 19, said Monday evening. "At times it would feel great and I'd run out to the mailbox. Then I would run up-and-down the lawn and ouch."

Now, Edwards is near 100 per cent and is working out two hours, three days-a-week at Acton high school, working on mid-speed work and strengthening exercises.

"I'm feeling really good, but it's pretty late in the season now," Edwards conceded, saying most athletes are either resting for the indoor season in September or training in Victoria, B.C., for the upcoming Commonwealth Games.

"For now I'll do a bit more training, stay healthy and look for a job."




