station asking how you can help. We urge all of you to write your Member of Parliament, Justice Minister Allan Rock and Immigration Minister Sergio Marchi. We must let our elected leaders know where we stand on crime and immigration.

For those of you who are unclear about what changes need to be made, here is where I stand on the issues:

IMMIGRATION:

1. Automatic deportation of those people who are not Canadian Citizens but have been convicted of a

2. Stricter controls and checks The members of 12 Division at our borders and airports so that valid refugees and immigrants are welcome, but known criminals are turned away before they establish

residency in Canada.

3. Photo identification and fingerprinting for all refugees and landed immigrants, to prevent criminal deportees from re-entering the country under altered, stolen or false identification and to prevent the profitable sale of lost and stolen passports and immigration papers.

4. People with criminal convictions in this country must be stopped from making refugee claims.

JUSTICE:

1. A return to capital punishment for the offense of murder.

2. A minimum sentence of five years for anyone caught in possession of an illegal handgun.

3. A minimum 10 year sentence for anyone convicted of using an illegal handgun in the commission of a criminal offense.

4. A return to the minimum of a seven-year sentence in jail for those convicted of trafficking narcotics.

5. A total re-vamping of the Young Offenders Act.

6. A hard look at the parole system in Canada, to prevent dangerous criminals from getting out before serving their full sentences.

It is the feeling of the officers of B Platoon, Division 12, that these changes will keep criminals off the street and out of the country.

Firefighters found that the alarm was actually set off by a technician who was testing the system and forgot to advise the fire department.


