Toronto committee wants money

Town Council wants more information before they ante up \$2,700 to the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) Economic Development Committee.

The cash request came from Halton Region, which said it will pay the Region's share of \$13,500 and then collect one-fifth of that amount from each municipality.

Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette said Halton Hills should not have to pay an equal share.

"I don't mind putting in some money, but I do have concerns about going in as an equal partner with Oakville and Burlington because I don't think we will get an equal response," Bonnette told Council last Monday.

"I would be willing to pay half of what is asked for — \$1,350." The money will be used by the

GTA for demographic and economic research on the GTA and print media advertising.

Town staff will report back on Bonnette's recommendation.

Queen St. apartment complex gets 'OK'

As long as the owner of a Queen Street apartment building submits a satisfactory site plan to the Town, he will be allowed to keep renting all 10 units in the building.

Recent Town and fire inspections found a number of violations including the use of four more units than permitted, inadequate parking and fire code deficiencies at 333 Queen St.

Recognizing the need for affordable housing, which the building provides, the Town's Committee of Adjustment voted to allow the additional units to remain in use if all violations are rectified and a minimum of eight parking spaces be provided.


